Dear Editor,

You report today (page 22) that a group of academics has written to MSPs opposing "proposed changes" to the 2021 Census question about a person's sex. But no change is being proposed. In the last Census, government guidance told trans people that they could answer the question with the sex that they live as (regardless of the sex that was registered for them at birth). In previous Censuses, there was no official guidance, but trans people were similarly able to do that:

It is the group of academics who are proposing a change, to force trans people to write in the sex on their current birth certificate; even if it's the opposite to the sex they live in and are known as, and the opposite to the sex shown on their passport, their driving licence and all their other documents.

The academics say this is because your current birth certificate shows your "legal sex". But there are questions in the Census about your race and religion for example. What is a person's legal race? Their legal religion? There is no such thing, but these questions work well.

The academics say that there will be implications for other statistical sources. That's true - other sources, including the Scottish Household Survey, the Scottish Social Attitudes Survey, and employer diversity monitoring for example, allow trans people to specify their sex as the sex they live as, and consistency with those is important.

The Census should continue with the practice that previous experience shows works well, allowing trans people to answer as the sex they live as. This will give data that is consistent with previous Scottish Censuses, consistent with the way the 2021 Census will be done in the rest of the UK, and consistent with other data sources.

Dear Mr Cameron.

I am emailing on behalf of the Equality Network and Scottish Trans Alliance, an organisation working for equality for LGBT people, about a question that arose in this morning's CTEEA Committee meeting.

This is the question of the compatibility of the Census sex question with the Equality Act 2010. The EA protects people from discrimination that happens "because of sex", and from harassment "related to sex", and of course that means that the protection goes wider than just protecting people on grounds of their "legal sex" (which is usually defined as, for most people, their original birth certificate sex, but, for those trans people who have obtained gender recognition, that recognised sex).

The EA also protects people who are discriminated against because of their perceived sex; and that includes trans people who do not have gender recognition; but who live in their transitioned sex and are treated by others as doing so. For example, many trans people are fully transitioned at work, and their work colleagues do not know that they are trans, but they do not have gender recognition, for a

variety of reasons. The EA protects them from discrimination that happens because of their lived sex, since that is their perceived sex, even though it is not their legal sex.

The EA protects people against harassment that is related to a protected characteristic, regardless of whether they actually have that characteristic, and including when the harasser knows that the harassed person does not have that characteristic (see for example the sexual orientation case English v Thomas Sanderson Blinds Ltd). So again, for example, a trans person who lives as a woman but has not obtained gender recognition is protected against misogynistic harassment, even if the harasser knows that she does not have gender recognition.

All this means that the set of people protected by the Equality Act from misogynistic discrimination and harassment aligns more closely with the set of people who live and present as women, than it does with the set of people whose current birth certificate (as in some cases modified by gender recognition) says female. Similarly for discrimination and harassment aimed at men. The EA rightly protects people from discrimination and harassment that is based on any of: their biological sex characteristics, their current birth certificate sex, and their perceived sex.

This is one reason (one of severall) why we consider that it is very important that the Census continues to allow the less than 1% of the population who are trans to answer the sex question in their lived sex, as they have been able to do for previous Censuses. The guidance for the sex question makes no difference at all to the 99+% who are not trans, but for those who are trans, keeping the question as a lived sex question, as previously, aligns best with their way they are protected by the Equality Act, as well as the way they are treated across a wide range of public services (for example a trans person can change the sex on their passport, their driving licence, their NHS records etc, without getting gender recognition). Other reasons why we think it is so important that trans people continue to be able to answer the sex question with their lived sex are set out in our letter to the CTEEA Committee members dated 10th September.

I hope that is useful, and we'd be very happy to meet with you to answer any questions or to discuss this further, if you wish.



Dear and colleagues,

Thanks very much for this morning, and for answering all those detailed and sometimes leading questions about the sex question.

In regard to Annabelle Ewing's question about Q3 and Q4, and why Q4 says "sex registered at birth" while Q3 guidance does not, the answer is surely that they are measuring two different things. Q4 is asking whether your identity now is at odds with your originally registered sex; Q3 is asking what your sex is now (however defined); there is of course no "legal inconsistency".

In terms of international comparisons, as far as we are aware, Ireland, Canada, Australia and New Zealand all allow trans people to answer the sex question in their lived sex, which of course is the matter at contention. Of course the trans status and equivalent questions vary a lot from country to country.

Joan McAlpine was of course entirely wrong to suggest that a lived sex question is inconsistent with the current state of the Equality Act, because the EA also protects trans people from discrimination because of their perceived sex – it does not only protect "biological" or "legal" women from misogynistic discrimination or harassment, but all trans women who face such discrimination / harassment because they are perceived as women. So the EA does not, as Joan McAlpine claimed, define sex discrimination as something that depends on a person's legal sex. The EA rightly protects people from discrimination on the basis of their biological sex characteristics, their legal sex, and their perceived sex.

Thanks very much for sending this through — It's great to see that the guidance is going to continue to be clear that it's a lived sex question, as it has always been! We were a little unsure after the content of the actual debate in the Lords.

Of course, retaining a binary sex question will continue the problem of how non-binary people should respond — which is why we think the approach you're taking to developing the question is much better. Using a non-binary sex question in the next Census is the only way to ensure that everyone can answer.

Apologies for late reply. Thanks so much for pulling together all the feedback into one document – that's really helpful and will be of use, I have passed this on to everyone who was at the meeting from NRS so that the evidence can be used in the legislative process when required.

Since the meeting, the decision was taken that for rehearsal the trans status question will be asked of the population who are 16 and over. This decision is only for the rehearsal and the evidence from your feedback and also from cognitive testing will be considered in order to make a decision in relation to any age limit for the question in 2021.



Scottish trans equality organisation the Scottish Trans Alliance, together with its parent LGBTI charity the Equality Network, welcome the Scottish Parliament report on the Census (Amendment) (Statement of the Census (Amendment of the

The report is the "stage 1 report", from the Parliament's Culture, Tourism, Europe and External Affairs Committee, about the general principles of the bill. It follows written and oral evidence-taking by the Committee over several weeks

The Census (Amendment) Bill allows for voluntary of person's sexual orientation, and on whether they are transgender, to be included in the 2021 Scottish Census. The Committee's report supports these proposals.

The Committee also reports that there was insufficient consultation on the detail of the bill, and they support amendments to the bill proposed by the Equality Network / Scottish Trans Alliance, to clarify the language. The Committee strongly recommends wide consultation over the next year on the detailed wording of the census questions on sex, sexual orientation and trans status, including with women's organisations, LGBT organisations and intersex organisations, and the Scottish Trans Alliance agrees with this

Vic Valentine, Policy Officer at the Scottish Trans Alliance, said "We welcome that the Committee supports the general principles of the bill, that there should be voluntary questions on sexual orientation and on a person's trans status, in the 2021 Census. We also welcome the Committee's support for our proposal to amend the bill's language on trans status, to remove confusion. We agree that there needs to be wide consultation during the preparation of the Census questions, over the next year, and that that should include consultation with women's organisations, and with intersex organisations, as well as LGBT organisations.

"However we disagree with the Committee's recommendation that the compulsory census question asking the person's sex should be restricted

to male and female answers only, because that means that, once again, non-binary people like myself will not be able to answer the question correctly and honestly."

The general principles of the Census (Amendment) Bill are due to be debated by the whole Parliament on Thursday 28th February.

Dear member of the CTEEA Committee,

Towards the end of the item on the Census Bill, in today's CTEEA Committee meeting, the Convener noted that some women's and LGBTI groups that have submitted evidence on the bill receive Scottish Government funding, and implied that that funding might influence those groups' evidence.

I would like to make clear that the Equality Network absolutely refutes any suggestion that our funders have any influence our policy positions, our evidence, or our campaign work.

We are, and have been for over 21 years, a flercely independent organisation. Our policy positions are entirely based on consultation with LGBTI people to find out their needs. We oppose Scottish Government policy when we think they have got it wrong — as members of the Committee know, that includes, but is certainly not limited to, suggesting amendments to legislation where we think it can be improved.

The Scottish Government have never attempted to influence our policy positions. We think that they understand that it is in their interests to hear the genuine views of L@BTI people, whether they like what they hear or not. If a funder ever did try to influence our policy, we would make it clear in no uncertain terms that their funding did not buy them that right, if, as a result, we lost that funding, we would be proud to do so.

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

No worries! Hope you're holding up ok. We're also working on a position paper on the Census that we can share more publicly, and I came across this in ONS' qualitative report on gender identity: phase 1 summary from September 2017:

We would also recommend that a question specifically about sex at birth, or one that forces an answer indicating a trans identity, should not be mandatory given the needs of trans people living with disclosure concerns.

They obviously didn't test the same suite of questions as you have, but that was their pretty clear finding on things they did test, including insisting on changing the sex question to a sex at birth one. Obviously I know you will have seen the report at the time, but just wanted to flag up for you this very succinct coverage of the issue!

No problem, always happy to chat! I thought it might be useful to put some of our conversation in writing in case it helps you going forward on what our position is.

So as we discussed, there were several reasons why a "legal sex" question would be unacceptable:

- The majority of trans people will continue to answer this question with how they identify.
- 2) Large numbers will be unhappy and complain about, or not answer the question at all, when realising there is an attempt to insist on categorising them by what is on their birth certificates and not who they are.
- It will do nothing to improve non-binary people's ability to answer in a way that reflects who they are,
- 4) For any trans men and women who feel obligated to respond with their legal sex where this doesn't correspond with their identity, this will be a regression in their rights to answer the Census in a way that reflects how they live and identify. There has been clear guidance for the last two Censuses from both NRS and ONS that trans men and women should answer in line with their identity, not with what is recorded on their birth certificates.
- 5) For any trans people who feel obligated to respond with their legal sex where this doesn't correspond with their identity, they will be reported on throughout all Centerports in a way that misgenders them. This will be sending a message to trans people that they are seen as "male" or "female" by NRS, regardless of their gender identity.
- 6) It is out of step with our ont approaches a lity across Scott particular, it is not in line with:
 - a. The Scottish Committee which it now does in a way that repeople live and identify, and in a non-binary inclusive manner, across its household surveys.
 - b. Legislation such as the Gender Representation on Public Board's Bill, which makes it clear that trans women without Gender Recognition Certificates are to be treated as women.

- c. The accepted position on trans equality throughout public bodies in Scotland and protected through the Equality Act 2010 that trans people's identities should be treated with respect and dignity regardless of whether or not they have a GRC particularly considering the current onerous and difficult process for obtaining gender recognition.
- 7) If there is a move to a question that captures "legal sex" it may be the case that between the Census being finalised and published, a third non-binary legal sex is recognised in Scotland, which would then render anyone who received gender recognition as a non-binary person completely unable to answer the question, either truthfully or untruthfully!
- 8) It is a fundamental misunderstanding to think that the necollected by the "sex" question is changing, particularly given the guidance for trans men and women over at least the past two Censuses. Trans people are a very small proportion of the population. For 99% of people (probably slightly more), biological sex, legal sex and self-identified sex are identical. Many trans people will view their biological sex as in line with their self-identified sex, and some trans people have a legal sex that corresponds with their self-identified sex. Acknowledging that less than 1% of the population have a slightly more complex relationship with the term "sex" than the majority does not dilute the quality of the data collected. The overall purpose and usefulness of collecting sex data is not impacted by being inclusive and respectful of the reality of trans people's lives.

All of the above would also apply to a move to collect "biological sex", with the addition that asking people their "biological sex" in a way that was explained as being defined as their sex assigned at birth may be unlawful given current Gender Recognition Act privacy protections.

I got the impression from our conversation that it was "legal sex" that was being touted as a more acceptable version of the two – to be clear we are entirely opposed to either. Any question that is designed to pressure trans people to answer, or record them as, something other than their self-identified sex is totally unacceptable. It would reflect a major setback in trans rights, and be entirely out of sync with the current Government's approach to trans equality.

As always, we are very happy to be included in any meetings where we can help clarify any of the above, or to meet with yourself and colleagues at NRS again anytime. We will certainly be happy to help recruit people for further question testing in the future as well — just let us know when future testing is coming up and we'll make sure to share it through our networks.

Thank you for your time yesterday – it was very helpful to hear your position. While I appreciate my questions may have appeared a little unusual given the work you have supported us with to date, I would like to stress that the conversation was simply so the NRS

had a clear view of the landscape and therefore how we can approach the legal and legislative processes for Census. This is particularly important for Census, as there are penalties associated with Census non-completion.

The points you raised yesterday were important in NRS being able to rule out some potential options for how we take this through the necessary processes. While the concerns you raised were not surprising, it was useful to have them reiterated again yesterday.

As things move forward with these questions, it is likely NRS will need to undertake further testing. This is simply because any changes we make to questions must be fully tested before they can be included in Census. The testing last week was very positive, but again did provide evidence where we may need to make some further small changes to the questions.

So this is simply a heads up that if you are able to support us with the support work on these questions would not be as far advanced as it currently is without the input from James and yourself.



Scottish Trans Alliance welcomes MSPs' report on the Census (Amendment) Bill

Scottish trans equality organisation the Scottish Trans Alliance, together with its parent LGBTI charity the Equality Network, welcome the Scottish Parliament report on the Gensus (Amendment) (Scotland) Bill, published today (Thursday 7th Feb):

The report is the "stage if report", from the Parliament's Culture, Tourism, Europe and External Affairs Committee, about the general principles of the bill. It follows written and oral evidence-taking by the Committee over several weeks.

The Census (Amendment) Bill allows for voluntary questions about a person's sexual orientation, and on whether they are transgender, to be included in the 2021 Scottish Census. The Committee's report supports these proposals.

The Committee also reports that there was insufficient consultation on the detail of the bill, and they support amendments to the bill proposed by the Equality Network? Scottlish Trans Alliance, to clarify the language. The Committee strongly recommends wide consultation over the next year on the detailed wording of the census questions on sex, sexual orientation and trans status, including with women's organisations,

LGBT organisations and intersex organistions, and the Scottish Transwith this,

Policy Officer at the Section 2016 and "We welcome that the Committee supports the general principles of the bill, that there should be voluntary questions on sexual orientation and on a person's trans status, in the 2021 Gensus. We also welcome the Committee's support for our proposal to amend the bill's language on trans status, to remove confusion. We agree that there needs to be wide consultation during the preparation of the Gensus questions, over the next year, and that that should include consultation with women's organisations, and with intersex organisations, as well as LGBT organisations.

"However we disagree with the Committee's recommendation that the compulsory census question asking the person's sex should be restricted to male and female answers only, because that means that, once again, non-binary people like myself will not be able to answer the question correctly and honestly."

The general principles of the Census (Amendment) Bill are due to be debated by the whole Parliament on Thursday 28th February.






Dear Mr Cameron,

I am emailing on behalf of the Equality Network and Scottish Trans Alliance, an organisation working for equality for LGBT people, about a question that arose in this morning's CTEEA Committee meeting:

This is the question of the compatibility of the Census sex question with the Equality Act 2010. The EA protects people from discrimination that happens "because of sex", and from harassment "related to sex", and of course that means that the protection goes wider than just protecting people on grounds of their "legal sex" (which is usually defined as, for most people, their original birth certificate sex, but for those trans people who have obtained gender recognition, that recognised sex)


The EA also protects people who are discriminated against pecause or their perceived sex, and that includes trans people who do not have gender recognition but who live in their transitioned sex and are treated by others as doing so. For example, many trans people are fully transitioned at work, and their work colleagues do not know that they are trans, but they do not have gender recognition, for a variety of reasons. The EA protects them from discrimination that have gender to consider their lived sex, since that is their perceived, sex, even though its post-boar loss.

The EA protects people against harassment that is related to a protected characteristic, regardless of whether they actually have that characteristic, and including when the harasser knows that the harassed person does not have that characteristic (see for example the sexual orientation case English v. Thomas Sanderson Blinds Ltd). So again, for example, a trans person who lives as a woman but has not obtained gender recognition is protected against misogynistic harassment, even if the harasser knows that she does not have gender recognition.

All this means that the set of people protected by the Equality Act from misogynistic discrimination and harassment aligns more closely with the set of people who live and present as women, than it does with the set of people whose current birth certificate (as in some cases modified by gender recognition) says female. Similarly for discrimination and harassment aimed at men. The EA rightly protects people from discrimination and harassment that is based on any of: their biological sex characteristics, their current birth certificate sex, and their perceived sex.

This is one reason (one of severall) why we consider that it is very important that the Census continues to allow the less than 1% of the population who are trans to answer the sex question in their lived sex; as they have been able to do for previous Censuses. The guidance for the sex question makes no difference at all to the 99+% who are not trans, but for those who are trans, keeping the question as a lived sex question; as previously, aligns best with their way they are protected by the Equality Act, as well as the way they are treated across a wide range of public services (for example a trans person can change the sex on their passport, their driving licence, their NHS records etc, without getting gender recognition). Other reasons why we think it is so important that trans people continue to be able to







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answer the sex question with their lived sex are set out in our letter to the CTEEA Committee members dated 10th September.

I hope that is useful, and we'd be very happy to meet with you to answer any questions or to discuss this fulfile, if you wish.
