| Completeness | The estimated very old population is on the same basis as the mid-year estimates i.e. if relevant at these ages the population includes all those usually resident there, whatever their nationality. |
| | Members of UK and non-UK armed forces stationed in Scotland are included; UK forces stationed outside Scotland are excluded. Short-term international migrants are excluded. |
| Comparability | Each publication includes a revised back-series for comparison as this is part of the method used. The estimates are consistent with the mid-year estimates for the 90+ age-group. |
